Cold Weather Guidelines

The Winter months often bring severe weather conditions. When it is -25° C or colder (with the wind chill), we will have indoor recess.

Exercise and fresh air are important for successful learning and parents are asked to ensure that all children come to school dressed for the weather. Even when it appears that the conditions would warrant indoor recess students should still be dressed appropriately keeping in mind that the ears, nose, fingers, and toes lose heat the fastest, and that a large portion of body heat is lost from the head. Children should use mittens instead of gloves, and wear snowsuits to protect from the wind. Children who come to school are expected to fully participate in the school program which includes recess breaks. Fresh air is not likely to worsen a mild cold if your child is dressed properly. If the cold or illness is severe, we respectfully suggest that the child not be sent to school.

Welcome Ms. Bond to Grade 7



Safety Concerns for Parents

Student safety is, and always will be, a top priority in all KPR schools, including ours. Several areas of concern have been noted particularly during the beginning and the end of the day here at Tilley. Please be reminded of the following:

- Pets are not permitted on KPR school properties.
- The KPR Code of Conduct (which applies to parents as well) states that we must all treat each other with respect. Therefore, the use of profanity and/or inappropriate gestures will not be tolerated.
- Vehicles are not to be abandoned in front of the pylons when the parking lot is closed for busses. If you do not make it to the parking lot prior to it being closed, please find a spot to park on the road.
- There is no parking allowed in the designated fire routes.
- Unfortunately, Tilley does not have a Kiss and Ride Drop off. The reason for this is that there is no safe place to put one. Stopping your car in front of the pylons, and getting out of your vehicle to let your children out is a very dangerous practice putting both you and your child in a potentially harmful situation.
- Excessive idling is occurring while students are being dropped off or picked up. We respectfully ask that our environment (and the air your children breathe) is considered.
- The driveway at Tilley is one way. Entrance is on the south side, and exit is on the north. Please do not enter through the exit. We have seen many close calls involving pedestrians, other vehicles, and even the school busses.
- J-walking is not acceptable and not safe. Please use our crossing guard.

We fully recognize that parents are busy, and have places to be, but you must understand that receiving and dismissing over 500 students in a timely and safe manner requires some cooperation. If you cannot participate in carpooling, or promote that your children walk, bike, etc. to school, then please take the extra few minutes to exercise your patience and keep the safety of everyone at Tilley a priority.

In case you missed it... NEW SAFE ARRIVAL

At Dr. Ross Tilley Public School, student safety is our highest priority. This includes making sure all of our students arrive safely at school, every day. With this in mind, we are introducing a new system that will make it easier for you to let us know when your child will be absent due to sickness or other reasons. It also will allow us to identify children who are absent, and ensure they are safe and accounted for, more efficiently and quickly.

As of January 30, 2017, we have begun using a new absence reporting system called **Safe Arrival**. It allows you to report your child's absence quickly and conveniently, in any one of the following three ways:

- By calling 1-866-740-2902 toll free
- By logging into the Parent Portal website at **kprdsb.schoolconnects.com** to set up the ability to report absences online, or
- By downloading an app onto your iOS or Android device, to report absences.


You are able to use whichever of these methods you prefer to report your child's absence, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. You are also able to report future absences at any time.

As an added feature, we have started using the automated telephone system used by high schools to contact parents who have not reported their child absent. Safe Arrival will continue attempting to reach multiple contact numbers, for a predetermined amount of time. If the automated system has not been able to reach someone in that allotted time frame, our office staff will follow up.

By using the toll free number, website or app to report your child absent before our morning bell time, you will NOT receive a call.

In the last few days, we have contacted you at the email address you provided, inviting you to log into the Parent Portal and activate your account. If you have changed your email address, please contact the school office to have your contact information updated. As of January 30, 2017, all absence reporting goes through the Parent Portal website or toll free number. Please do not contact the school directly to report an absence.

Thank you for your patience and cooperation during this transition period, to better ensure the safety of all our children. Please do not hesitate to call the school should you have any questions.



Be a Math Role Model

You are an important part to your child's success in math. It's true! Your encouragement, interest, and positive attitudes about math can go a long way to helping your child.

What can I do to support my child's math learning?


Encourage your child. Help your child to not get discouraged when learning a concept or skill proves harder than was hoped. Remind your child that success comes from hard work and perseverance, and that making mistakes is part of learning and growing. Be genuinely curious about what your child is thinking and learning.

Be positive about math! Avoid saying "I was never good at math" or "I never liked math." Show that you think math is important and interesting. Use numbers when you discuss daily activities, sports, and so on. Look for opportunities for math to be a natural part of your conversations.

Ensure your child keeps up with his/her math homework. Make sure that your child catches up if any days at school were missed, because math concepts build on one another.

Be available to talk with your child about his/her math work. But don't do your child's work for him/her. Give your child time to figure out the answers on their own. When your child needs support, ask questions instead of showing your child directly how to do it. Allow your child to share the method used in class. If you aren't familiar with the method, ask your child to explain it to you. This will help your child to understand it better as well. If you and your child are more comfortable in a language other than English, use it. Your child will understand concepts better in the language that he/she knows best. Help your child make connections to math in everyday activities. Make available the tools your child needs to do math. For example, ruler, graph paper, protractor, etc.

Ask your child's teacher to suggest ways you can help your child with math.



Support for Problem Solving

If your child is struggling with a problem, remind your child that problem solving takes time. It also takes perseverance.

Encourage your child to use problem-solving strategies he/she is learning in school. For example:

- consider starting with the simplest part of the problem
- make a model or draw a diagram
- make a table, chart, or list
- guess, check, and revise
- look for a pattern
- use a formula
- work backward



Use question prompts to help your child discover a solution. For example:

- What information are you given? What are you asked to find?
- What is happening in the problem? Can you draw a picture of the situation to help you solve it?
 What other ways could you represent the problem? (e.g., make a model, act it out, write a number sentence or equation, organize the data in a table, etc.)
- What do you know by looking at the diagram?
- What strategies have you used before that you might try here?
- Is there another way you might have solved this problem?

Encourage your child to always check the accuracy of his/her work. By checking,

your child will practise skills, build understanding, and become more self-reliant. Ask your child to explain why the solution is correct or incorrect.

Talk aloud as you solve everyday problems of all kinds. Discuss alternative

approaches and solutions with your child. Modelling how to solve a problem with your child will give your child more ideas and strategies.
